Given its deliciously varied countryside, its abundance of romantic castles, and its medieval villages, it's no wonder that for those who travel there it is an escape from the reality of everyday life as the scenery brings back all the magic of childhood dreams.

### HIDDEN GEM


Gerberoy is just such a place. It is the sweetest of medieval villages, and sits on a hill midst rolling farmland and wooded valleys, with long-ranging, breathtaking views.

The town has been designated as one of the 140 most beautiful villages in France. It is the very essence of French Country. There are no stores, no distracting billboards. With only two streets, and narrow cobbled ones at that, and no telephone or electricity wires in sight, you feel as though you are truly walking through the pages of an old storybook. The most iconic house in town is the Maison Bleue, with the date of 1691 carved over the front door. Hollyhocks and hydrangeas grow rampantly throughout this tiny village.

# Path to Pleasure A cobblestone street meanders along historic homes lined with hollyhocks, roses, hydrangeas and goldenrods.




Rambling roses clamber over plaster walls to meet shuttered windows, often thrown open to capture the fragrance of the very flower.

BUILDING ON THE PAST Gerberoy is today the smallest town in France, but it was once a very powerful city and saw many battles during the Hundred Years War. At the end of that time, the local château laid in ruins. Centuries later, in 1901, it was that château, and the picturesque village as well, that convinced the Post-Impressionist painter Henri Le Sidaner to settle here. The artist set about creating a comfortable place in which to live by enlarging an old cottage and converting a barn into an art studio. He then built a pavilion and set a cupola, called the Temple of Love, on a portion of the crumbling 15th century tower. The château's ruins were transformed into terraced gardens, bounded by baroque stone balustrades. And he planted roses everywhere and gave rose bushes to everyone in the village.

CASTING A FRAGRANT SPELL Roses became the symbol of the town and, since 1928, are celebrated every June during the Fête des Roses, with unfailing popularity. Lovers of the queen of the flowers can buy roses grafted from those first bushes at the town's delightful B&B, Le Logis de Gerberoy. Though the lovely village is close enough to Paris to be a popular weekend destination, it remains pristine, uncontrived, and immune to the lure of commerce. A true 21st century fairy tale.
